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Scope of the Course

The B.A. degree in English Language and Literature seeks to develop a broad range of skills, including general communicative competence as well as technical, of literary critical analysis, and other job-related skills. The course will give close attention to a range of literary and other works written in different styles, periods and countries; and from this study, the learner is expected to develop an awareness of changing trends in literature, techniques and efforts adopted by different writers as well as knowledge of many well-known and less well-known writers and literary works.

Eligibility for Admission

Candidates who have passed in Higher Secondary Examinations conducted by any State Board/Central Board of Secondary Education in India.

Duration of the Course

The Course shall extend over a period of three years comprising six semesters with two semesters in one academic year. There shall not be less than 90 working days for each semester. Examination shall be conducted at the end of every semester of the respective subject.

Passing Minimum

External

In the university examinations, the passing minimum shall be 40% out of 75 Marks (30 Marks)

Eligibility for Examinations

A candidate will be permitted to appear for the University Examination only on earning 75% of attendance and only when her conduct has been satisfactory. It shall be opened to grant exemption to a candidate for valid reasons subject to conditions prescribed.

Classification of a Successful Candidate

Successful Candidates passing the examinations of core courses (Main & Allied Subjects) and securing Marks

i) A Candidate who passes all the examinations in the First Attempt within a period of three years securing 75% and above marks in the aggregate shall be declared to have passed B.A. degree examination in <u>First Class with Distinctions</u>. 60% and above but below 75% shall be declared to have passed the examinations in <u>first class</u> without distinction. Successful candidates passing the UG Degree examination securing 50 to 60 % shall be declared to have passed in <u>Second Class</u>.

All the remaining successful candidates shall be declared to have passed the examination in <u>Third</u> <u>Class</u>.

Candidate who passes all the examinations prescribed for the course at the first appearance itself and within a period of 3 consecutive academic years from the year of admission only will be eligible for University Rank.

Eligibility for Award of the Degree

A Candidate shall be eligible for the award of the degree only if she has undergone the above degree for a period of not less than 3 academic years comprising 6 semesters and passes the examinations prescribed and fulfills such conditions prescribed therefore.

Procedure in the event of Failure

If a candidate fails in a particular subject, she may reappear for the university examination in the concerned subject in subsequent and shall pass the examination.

Commencement of these Regulations

These regulations shall take effect from the academic year 2017-18 (i.e) for the students who are admitted to the first year of the course during the academic year 2017-18 and thereafter.
