- ✚ This is the motto of our Chairman and Secretary and he has extended his services by providing Free Education and Free concession for - Parentless students, physically challenged and the student achievers in sports. The fund released for 115 students is Rs.77,73,500/-
- ✚ Moreover, we are conducting Arivuthiran Exam every year for +2 students. The students who Secure high marks are provided with Free Education
- ✚ Our college received Rs.67,00,000/- from the government towards scholarship for 900 SC/ST students. In addition to this, 75 students stand to benefit by Indira Gandhi Scholarship and 45 students receive Minority scholarship
- ✚ The Management plies over 225 free buses for the students and the staff from various places to the college
- ✚ Tailoring and typing classes also have been started for the enrichment of the students' employability status
- ✚ National Service Scheme of Periyar University functions with five units with 500 volunteers, on our premises. We conduct regular and special camp programmes. Our NSS volunteers have created awareness among the village people viz Eradication of child labour, Aids awareness, Dengue Awareness and Voters Awareness
- ✚ They also screened a documentary film on Aids Awareness. Our NSS volunteers also organized a Youth Rally
- ✚ So far 320 students from various departments got placed in various companies. Their minimum salary is Rs 1.2 lakhs per annum and the highest is Rs 2.2 lakhs.
- ✚ Our college has launched Women Development Cell to have an exclusive focus on women oriented aspects
- ✚ In this academic year a Mega Science Expo had been organized and all the department students exhibited their talent and in connection with this a book also has been released.

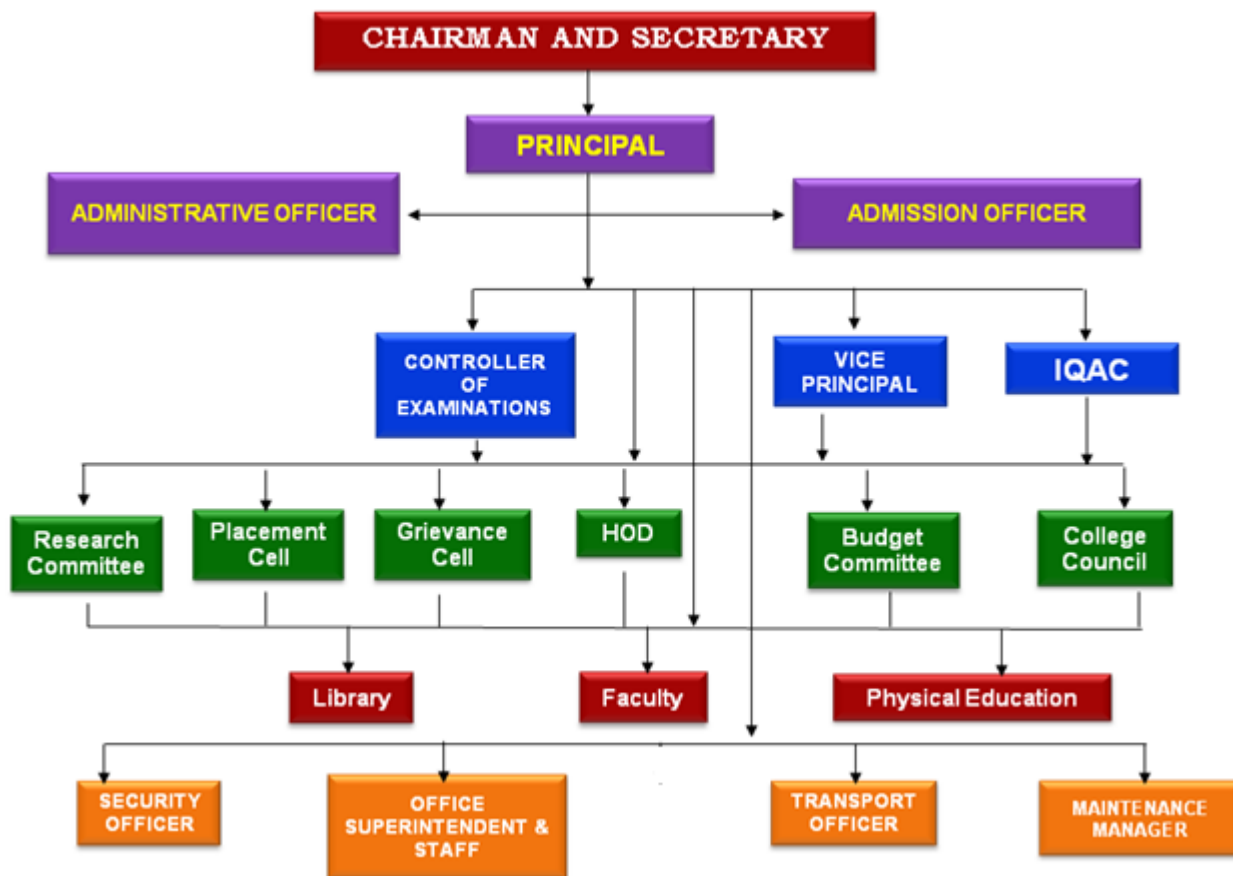

A digital library is a collection of documents in organized electronic form, available on the Internet or on CD-ROM (compact-disk read-only memory) disks. Depending on the specific library, a user may be able to access magazine articles, E-Books, and E-Journals.

Our VICAS Library offered three mega online databases like DELNET, N-List, and also subscribed SAGE online journals.

These databases provide listed below of e-books and e-journals for research purpose.

At present VICAS library having 22 PCs for main library and 21 PCs in commerce library are regularly used by 156-250 students per day averagely.

It preserves our digital work over the long term. DSpace provides a way to manage our research materials and publications in a professionally maintained repository to give them greater visibility and accessibility over time. DSpace is typically used as an institutional repository. Facilitate the capture and ingest of materials, including metadata about the materials Facilitate easy access to the materials, both by listing and searching→ Facilitate the long term preservation of the materials.


